

INTRODUCTION

It is a primary purpose of the College to treat all people with dignity and respect and provide an educational environment that is safe, supportive and inclusive.

A school uniform defines an identity for the College within the wider community, promotes student allegiance and is a means towards providing equality amongst children regardless of socio-economic background. The wearing of school uniforms by students helps build self-confidence, a sense of belonging and connection with their community.

AIM

The College takes the matter of uniform seriously and so do our students and parents. A school uniform contributes to the following:

- It benefits the College because the wearing of our uniform fosters a sense of belonging, pride and commitment to the College. When students are in the wider community they are easily identifiable which can further promote the College and enhance College spirit.
- It promotes equality amongst students by discouraging competition and short term fashion trends.
- Promotes a sense of inclusiveness, non discrimination and equal opportunity.
- It increases personal safety of students and staff by allowing easier recognition of visitors and potential intruders in the school.
- It is economical because our uniforms are of good quality, last longer and are generally better value than most casual clothes that students choose to wear. Peer pressure is reduced through consistency in uniform.
- Many Occupational Health and Safety (OH&S) concerns are reduced through the wearing of uniform. Safety of our students is our highest priority.

POLICY

Bairnsdale Secondary College expects that students wear the approved College uniform. This is consistent and in alignment with the Department of Education Guidelines relating to dress codes. We understand that we have a duty of care for our students and that a uniform provides a consistent and appropriate dress code for the range of activities students undertake at school.

This policy outlines a standard of dress for students, including details around what constitutes the College uniform and where and when it should be worn. While a uniform provides a similar dress code for all students there are many opportunities for our students to express their individuality – not only in their appearance but also in other fields such as the arts, music, sports, leadership and academic achievement.

IMPLEMENTATION

Uniform Requirements:

Uniform must be worn travelling to and from school, during a school day, immediately after Physical Education or any session where students are wearing alternative clothing. This applies at the end of the school day when travelling home.

Uniform must be worn at any program that promotes the College, eg: Information Evenings and Awards Nights. Full uniform must be worn on excursions. Students not in uniform may be removed from the excursion.

During Interschool Sports events all students are expected to leave school in full school uniform and change into sporting attire at the venue. All students must return to school in full uniform.

Exceptions for Uniform Wearing:

The College expects students to wear the uniform at all times as listed above, however there are occasions where the uniform is not worn:

- On extended camps and tours
- College production and rehearsals out of College hours
- College sport days (athletics, swimming)
- Organised casual days

Wearing of Hats:

The College Sunsmart Policy includes a Sunsmart hat as a part of the school uniform. It is a navy blue bucket hat with College logo. This is expected to be worn during terms 1 and 4 of each school year. A College beanie (navy blue with College logo) may be worn during terms 2 and 3.

Peaked caps are not approved uniform items. They are not “Sunsmart” and must not be worn at Bairnsdale Secondary College. Hats of all types must be removed when inside school buildings.

Makeup and Jewellery:

The College believes that with over 1000 people working closely together, there needs to be a balance between allowing people to express their individuality and asking them to conform to group behaviour. We also believe that young people should be encouraged to understand that individuality need not just be expressed by physical appearance. Make up and jewellery is allowed, but it should be minimal, unobtrusive and conform to all OH&S requirements. Safety precludes the following items from being worn (this list is not exhaustive):

- Large earrings (including hoop earrings)
- Long, sharp or protruding jewellery
- Bands or belts with studs or spikes
- Chains
- Inappropriate images such as bullets, marijuana leaf design etc.

Students may be asked to remove some jewellery during practical classes due to safety reasons

Hair Style and Colour:

The College believes that choosing hair colour and style is an individual’s right. However there are some circumstances where student safety or hygiene or a can be risked by loose or long hair. Students may be asked to contain long hair in a hair tie or hair net in some classes (for example when preparing food, using a lathe in woodwork or a bunsen burner in science).

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Lost Clothing:

Please clearly label all clothing and footwear. We endeavour to return all lost clothing to its rightful owner, and clearly labelled items make this process more efficient.

Uniform Items and Styles:

All uniform clothing can be purchased from our school uniform supplier Gippsland Safety Supplies located at 469 Princess Highway Bairnsdale. Most uniform items will have the Bairnsdale Secondary College logo embroidered on it. Only uniform items purchased through our supplier are guaranteed to be school uniform. Items purchased elsewhere may not be approved. Students who wear non approved items of clothing may be classified as 'Out of Uniform'.

Gippsland Safety Supplies provide a recycled uniform shop in the same location.

Approved Uniform Items:

Footwear:

All footwear must conform to OH&S requirements and students may be excluded from class activities if appropriate footwear is not worn. As such, the type and style of footwear is extremely important. School shoes must:

- be black with leather uppers
- be fully enclosed
- not be 'T' bar, slip on or sandals style
- be worn with socks or stockings - a range of hygiene issues arise when students do not wear socks.

Year 12 Clothing Variations:

Bairnsdale Secondary College believes that our Year 12 students can wear a variation of our regular uniform. In addition to the items listed above, Year 12 students have the choice to wear a specially designed class jumper or jacket. The jumper or jacket will be designed annually through consultation with the Principal Team, the Senior Learning Hub Team, Student Representative Committee (SRC) and Year 12 students via Pastoral Care meetings.

The Year 12 jacket / jumper will:

- use the colours of navy blue, white, and yellow as the basis for its design
- be affordable for all students
- be narrowed down to one option each year
- be aesthetically appealing
- not have inappropriate diagrams, descriptors or names
- be able to be worn by all body types and sizes
- not have a hood
- Be approved by the Principal Team of Bairnsdale Secondary College

What is not part of our school uniform:

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Determination of what constitutes uniform is by teachers and final decisions rest with Hub Leaders and / or the Principal Team.

Out of Uniform:

It is an expectation that all students attend school in full school uniform. On any occasion that a student is unable to wear full uniform (for example medical reasons) they should wear as much of the uniform as possible. Parents/carers should provide a written note explaining why the student is not in full uniform, or contact the relevant Hub via phone or email.

Hub Leaders or Year Level Coordinators will work with students and families to remedy problems with failure to wear approved College uniform. Parents will be notified of ongoing uniform issues. Provisions regarding 'Out of Uniform' will be implemented in alignment with our College Values and our Student Engagement and Wellbeing Policy.
